

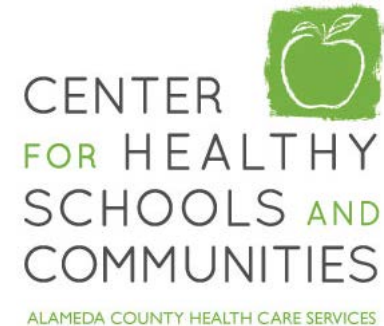

An African American child living in Oakland's flatlands will die, on average, 15 years before a Caucasian child living in the City's most affluent area—the Oakland hills.



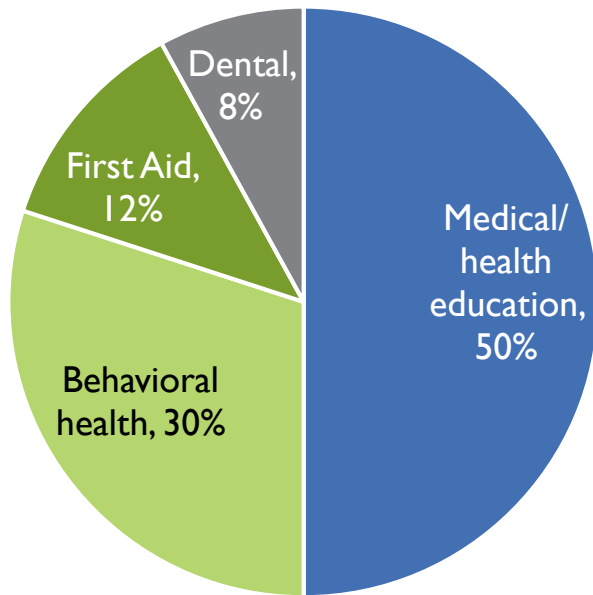
Our Results Framework

School Health Centers and Academics

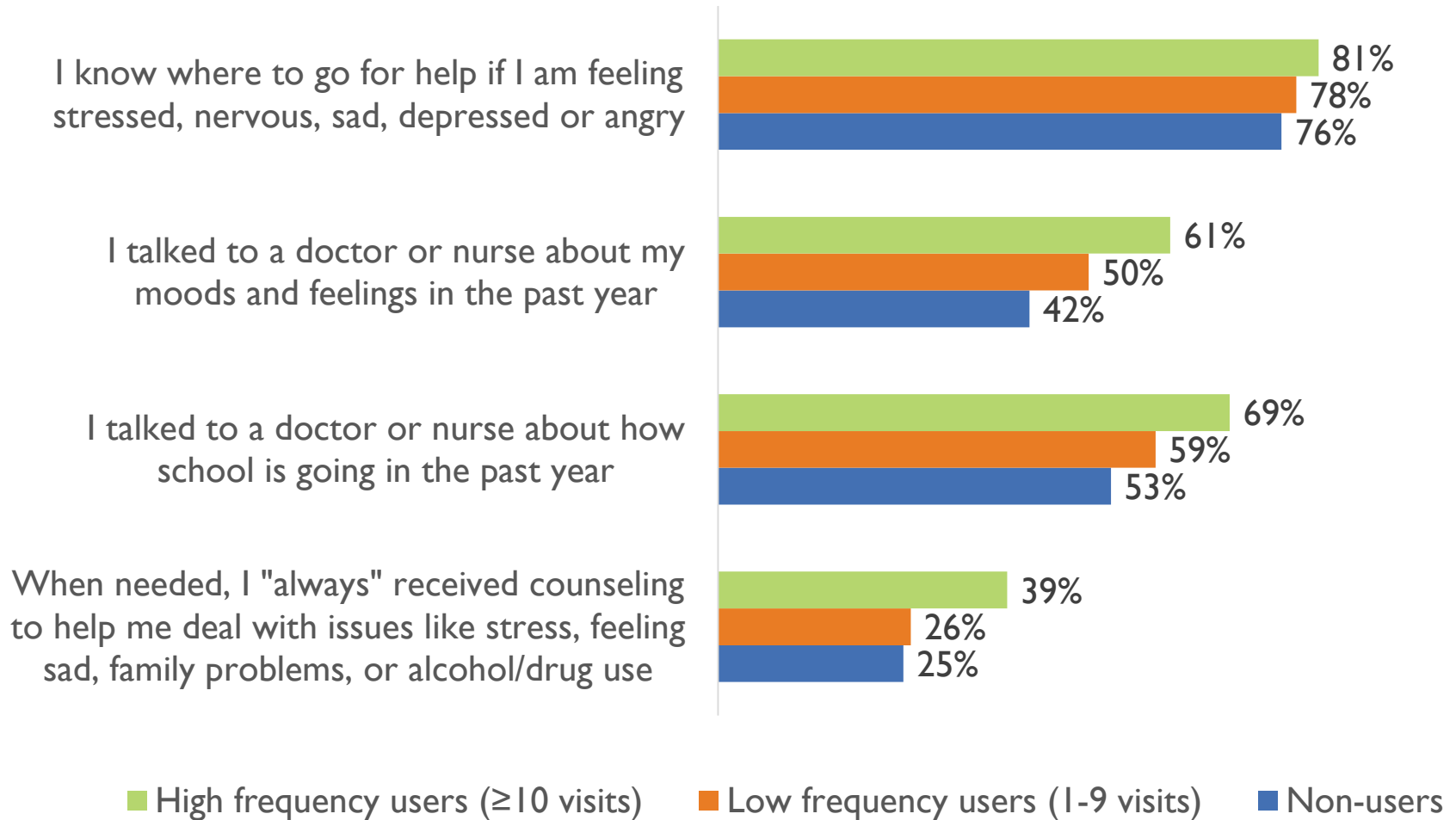
65,691 School Health Center Visits in 2016-17

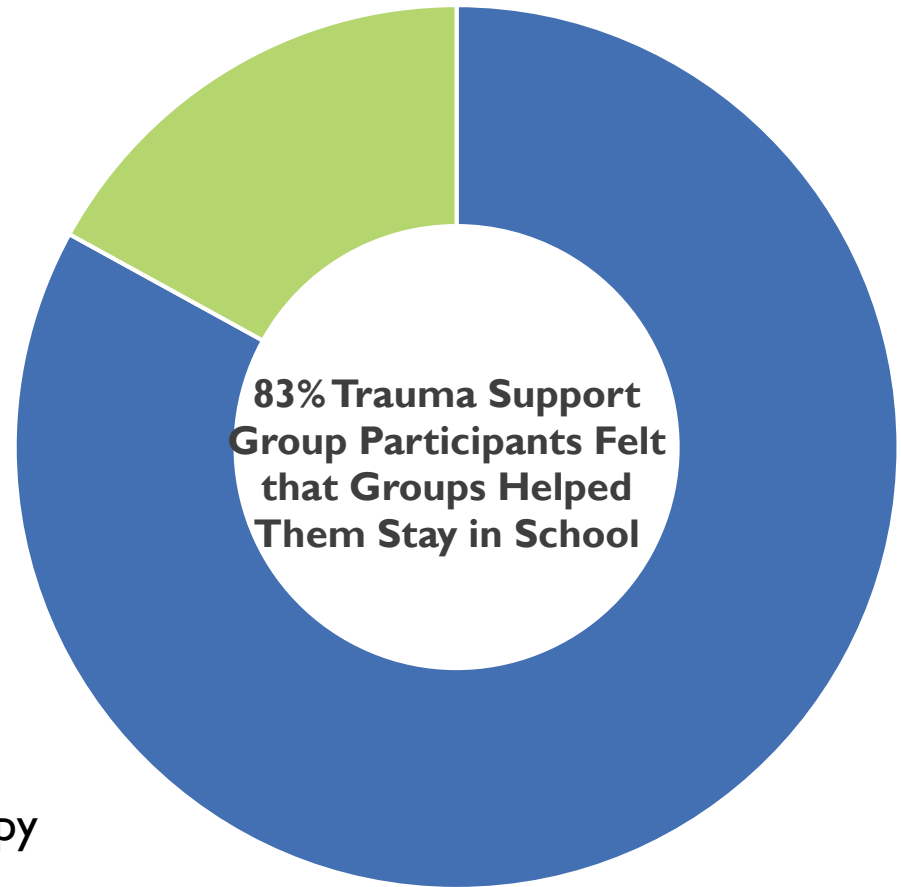

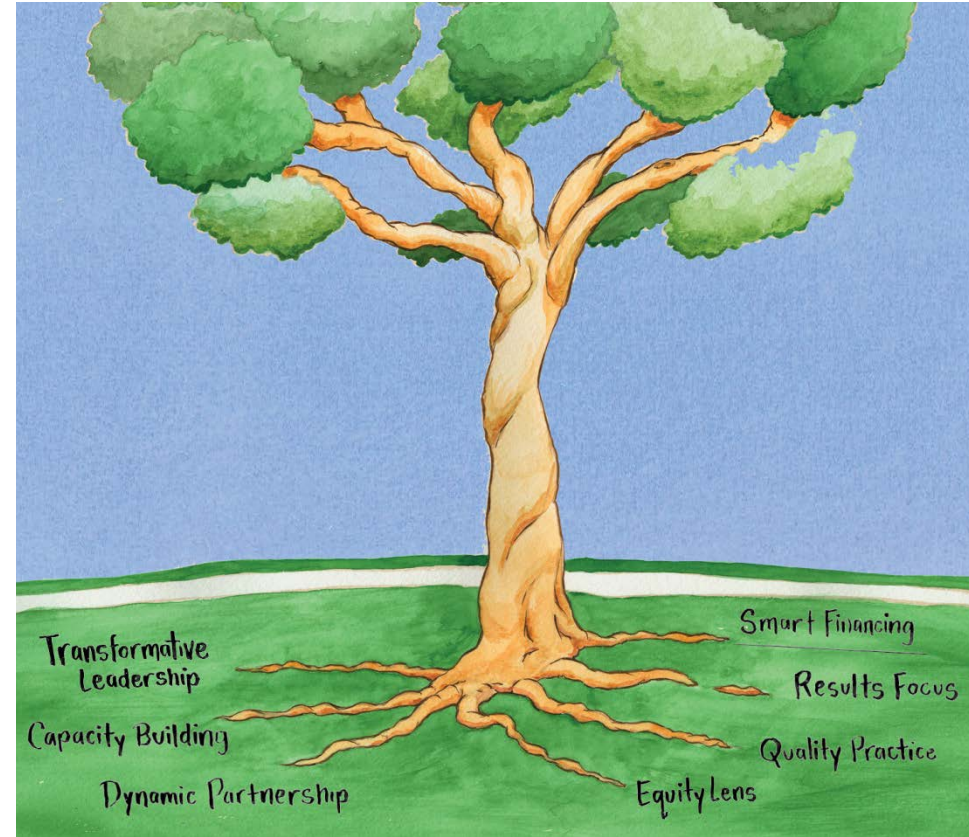
