

### Recom mendations

- Recommendations are submitted to the Statewide Opioid Settlement Administrator (SOSA) or State designee.
- The SOSA will aggregate and present recommendations at the public meetings.
- Recommendations can be submitted by anyone in the state.



# **Regional Coalitions**

- Develop and maintain one coalition/advisory group per designated region
  - On a quarterly basis, the RCCA will collaborate with local or regional recovery councils and coalitions to gather input and ensure subrecipient funding:
    - Addresses local priorities
    - Addresses equity & inclusion
    - Is culturally & linguistically competent
    - Improves the identified social determinants of health (SDOH) in each region
    - Falls under State strategies
- Complete one annual work plan per region
  - Includes how the RCCA sub-recipients' organizations plan to address institutionalized inequities and improve people's SDOHs regardless of race, gender, religion, sexual orientation, or ability.
- Develop and offer training and technical assistance
  - For staff and sub-recipients as part of each region's plan and adjust based on need.

### Access Narcan

# One program reported that they "reduced overdose fatalities by 30%" by saturating their county with Narcan.

- Programs **used data to identify specific neighborhoods and other locations** experiencing an increase in overdoses to inform Narcan distribution efforts.
- Partnering with a wide variety of organizations and businesses was essential to Narcan distribution efforts. Narcan was
  distributed more broadly, including to underserved areas, such as:
  - Rural communities
  - Correctional facilities
  - Hospitals
  - Local libraries
  - Clothing stores
  - Art centers
  - K-12 Schools
  - Colleges and universities
  - Gaming centers
  - Laundromats
  - Funeral homes
  - Sporting arenas
  - Mutual aid groups
  - · Parks and recreation centers

- Religious institutions
- Food banks and pantries
- Police departments
- Health care facilities
- Jails

We've partnered with local libraries, we've partnered with clothing stores, we've partnered with art centers, schools, gas stations, gaming centers, anything you can think of, laundromats, parks and recs, where we set up education sites. We've got brochures, bookmarks on how to use Naloxone, QR codes that take you to videos. All materials are in Spanish and English. Then we also have our Narcan at these sites. I believe we are at 125 sites across eight counties, which is impressive. – DOPP enrollee representative

## CORS (Community Outreach and Recovery Supports)

Purpose: deliver support services to individuals with opioid use disorder (OUD) and other substance use disorders (SUDs) experiencing homelessness or housing instability

- Programs reach out to individuals experiencing homelessness to link to needed services and supports.
- Engage individuals where they are from both a physical perspective (e.g. train stations, homeless encampments, libraries, parks, etc.) and recovery perspective.
  - Trains: providers ride trains to engage with individuals that use them for housing.
- Collaboration with community partners and other organizations is essential to success.
- Services are provided by persons with lived experience.
